

### Bringing water to Gaza

Thanks to your donations to our Middle East Crisis Appeal, our partner the Agricultural Development Association (PARC) has reached over 430,000 people staying in non-UN shelters, and with overcrowded host families. They have distributed drinking water and food packages including fresh vegetables and dried goods, as well as essentials like nappies, blankets and hygiene kits. Christian Aid enabled PARC to work with a food manufacturer to turn a large quantity of dried milk into cheese to distribute. They have also designed and built bathrooms and temporary shelters to house thousands of displaced people.

Today, she is building a new home and best of all she has been reunited with her three sons.
